Curriculum

Running full-time from October to July, the programme starts with a Core Curriculum that provides a strong foundation, introducing European and German law with an international perspective. Building on this, students can choose specialised tracks in Justice & Security, Law & Society, or Innovation & Transformation, gaining in-depth, research-based expertise to excel in academia or legal practice in today's global legal landscape.



Target Group

Designed for graduates with a strong foundation in foreign law and at least one year of professional experience, the programme equips participants with advanced knowledge and skills tailored to their professional and academic aspirations. It fosters a deeper understanding of legal principles and their international dimensions, enabling participants to engage critically with complex legal issues.

Winter term

Core Curriculum



Introduction into European and German Law

To introduce the students to the fundamental principles of European and German law. The module covers the multi-level structure of the European and German legal system in its international context and compares it to other legal systems. The acquired basic knowledge is deepened in the core areas of private, public and criminal law.



Academic writing and jurisprudence

The module introduces students with theories of jurisprudence, with interdisciplinary approaches and with the standards of writing academic papers in preparation for the Master thesis; the standards customary in German jurisprudence are followed for this purpose.



Legal reasoning and legal theory

The module introduces students to the fundamentals of legal reasoning and legal theory. Students are familiarized with the main theories of law and with the methodology of legal decision-making.



Research perspectives

The module introduces students to research perspectives in the specializations offered as part of the program. Students are guided in finding topics for their Master thesis and preparing research proposals.

Justice & Security

The module is concerned with current global challenges to justice and security, such as war, terrorism, climate change, societies in transition and authoritarian rule. It explores the existing legal frameworks and also asks how the law can respond to these current challenges. In addition to more theoretical and doctrinal perspectives, the module incorporates historical angles and practitioner views.



Innovation & Transformation

The module is dedicated to the legal framework of innovation in times of global challenges. The lectures and seminars address the different fields of technology law, intellectual property, data protection and other areas of law in their function as a factor of technical and social transformation.



Law & Society

The module is concerned with current legal challenges in the context of law and society as a field of interdisciplinary legal studies. Doctrinal legal research is complemented by social sciences, critically reflecting the opaque separation of knowledge by different academic disciplines. By this interdisciplinary approach, functions and interdependencies of law are examined in an integrative and methodologically reflected way.



General

The module allows students to combine courses from the various specialisations and take an individual selection of in-depth courses.
